1. THE ECUMENICAL JURY 2012



Charles MARTIG (Switzerland), President

After studying theology, journalism and communication in Friburg and Amsterdam, Charles MARTIG obtained a PhD in theology with a study on the films of Lars Von Trier. He published numerous articles and books on "theology and cinema" and organizes international seminars on the same theme. Director and head of the cinema section of the Catholic Media Center in German-speaking Switzerland, he has been member of the Ecumenical Jury in Berlin, Cannes, Locarno, Karlovy Vary.

Marianne SMILEY (Canada)

Marianne SMILEY has been working in the professional movie world for fifteen years. After training as an actress in Manhattan, she writes scripts including for the Canadian Broadcasting Corp. and directs films on the Lebanese Christian community. Since 2004, she works as press officer for juries and filmmakers at the World Film Festival in Montreal and at the Toronto Festival. A member of INTERFILM, she is striving to promote films that showcase spiritual values and stimulate discussion and dialogue around themes such as "cinema and religion".



Magali VAN REETH (France)

A film reviewer for several websites of the French Catholic Church as well as a network of parish websites, Magali VAN REETH also worked for other media such as press, radio and television. She facilitates film discussions in commercial theatres and a workshop on cinema and spirituality in a prison. She is in charge of cinema at the Art. Culture and Faith department of the Lyon diocese. Member of the Fipresci, of the French Union of Film Journalists and Secretary General of SIGNIS-France since 2006, she has been a member of the Ecumenical Jury in Berlin, Locarno, Karlovy Vary, Erevan...

Jean-Luc GADREAU (France)

After studies in communication focused on radio, press, TV and cinema and a theological training within the Baptist Federation, Jean-Luc GADREAU combines a pastoral ministry with art and communication activities. He is parish pastor and director of the Baptist School of Communication, Art and Multimedia (EBCAM). Chief editor of the magazine "Horizons Evangéliques", he regularly facilitates a film discussion club. He is a member of the Information-Communication-Documentation Commission of the French Protestant Federation.





Kodjo AYETAN (Togo)

From Lomé, Togo, Kodjo AYETAN is the holder of a degree in Law and participated at several training sessions on cinema. A journalist and film reviewer, he writes since 2003 for the "Présence Chrétienne" newspaper, is the editor of the Togolese film magazine "Camera" and collaborates with several newspapers and websites. Member of SIGNIS-Togo and of the African Federation of Film Reviewers, he has been member of the Ecumenical Jury in Amiens, Besançon and Ouagadougou.

Bojidar MANOV (Bulgaria)

After obtaining a PhD on film theory and history, Bojidar MANOV becomes Dean of the "Screen Arts' Faculty at the National Academy of Theatre and Film in Sofia. He is a film reviewer, journalist and author of many articles and books, and teaches dramatic art at the New Bulgarian University. A former member of the Bulgarian Film Council and Vice-President of the Fipresci, he represented INTERFILM in Ecumenical Juries in Karlovy Vary, Kiev, Locarno.

2. THE ECUMENICAL JURY

Present in Cannes since 1974, the Ecumenical Jury is one of only three juries, along with the Official Jury and the Fipresci jury, invited by the Festival to give Prizes and Commendations to films in the official competition.

Each year, SIGNIS and INTERFILM nominate an Ecumenical Jury composed of 6 members, from different countries and cultures, who may be film journalists, critics, theologians, researchers or teachers. Though the members are from the Catholic, Protestant or Orthodox churches they are open to inter-religious dialogue with Jews, Muslims, Buddhists...

The Jury is completely independent and during the Festival they meet together to analyze and comment on the films.

3. ITS ROLE

The Ecumenical Jury has a particular perspective on the films. It honours works of artistic quality which witness to the power of film to reveal the mysterious depths of human beings through what concerns them, their hurts and failings as well as their hopes.

It draws attention to those works of quality which touch the spiritual dimension of our existence, expressing the values of justice, human dignity, respect for the environment, peace and solidarity. These values, shared in all cultures, are also those of the Christian Gospel.

In its choices the Ecumenical Jury has shown an openness to cultural, social or religious diversity, as it shows in the list of Ecumenical awards given at Cannes, as in other festivals, the Ecumenical Jury will be judged by its awards.

4. ITS PRIZE

At the end of the Festival, the Jury announces its awards at an official ceremony organized by the management of the Festival and attended by official guests, journalists and, of course, directors of the awarded films.

Since 1974, the Ecumenical Jury has awarded 40 Prizes and many Commendations. These awards are a testament to the quality of the choices of the Ecumenical Jury.

6. CRITERIA OF THE ECUMENICAL JURY

The Ecumenical Jury makes awards to films and to filmmakers according to the criteria developed by SIGNIS and INTERFILM as guidelines for judging films:

a) High artistic quality

The jury takes into account the artistic talent and technical skill manifested by the director and the film-makers. Films which receive awards should be of high artistic quality.

b) Message of the Gospel

The jury encourages films which lend expression to a human viewpoint or stimulate debate, raise audience consciousness of the transcendent dimensions of life or portray spiritual values in keeping with the message of the Gospel.

c) Christian responsibility and human progress

The Jury give special attention to themes relevant to Christian responsibility in modern society and encourages films which dramatise human values and contributes to human progress concerning:

- respect for human dignity and human rights;
- solidarity with all kind of minorities, disadvantaged and oppressed people;
- support for processes for liberation, justice, peace and reconciliation;
- preserving creation and the environment.

d) Universal impact

Films which receive awards have a universal impact and are not confined to their national or local context. They reflect their local culture and help audiences to respect the language and the images of that culture.

e) Inventive expression

Regarding all the criteria listed above, the Jury takes into consideration that a film deserves to receive an award if its intention, choice of issues and story telling have found an adequate, convincing and some inventive expression.

f) Distribution

Films which have received awards can be recommended for groups to see, discuss and use in appropriate ministries.
